

About the IJOH

DEPAUL UNIVERSITY'S LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

At DePaul University, we acknowledge that we live and work on traditional Native lands that are today home to representatives of well over one hundred different tribal nations. We extend our respect to all of them, including the Potawatomi, Ojibwe, and Odawa nations, who signed the Treaty of Chicago in 1821 and 1833. We also recognize the Ho-Chunk, Myaamia, Menominee, Illinois Confederacy, and Peoria people who also maintained relationships with this land.

We acknowledge that these sacred homelands were ruptured by the European invasion of the Americas. In 1493, Pope Alexander VI promulgated the Doctrine of Discovery, which seized Native lands and resources with impunity. This doctrine has been used by countries throughout the Americas, including the U.S., to legitimize colonial policies of displacement and genocide toward Native peoples and to justify colonial legacies of white superiority and global capitalism.

We appreciate that today Chicago is home to one of the largest urban Native population in the United States. We further recognize and support the enduring presence of Native peoples among our faculty, staff, and student body. And in the spirit of St. Vincent de Paul, we reaffirm our commitment, both as an institution and as individuals, to help make our community and our society a more equitable, welcoming, and just place for all.



DEPAUL UNIVERSITY'S COMMITMENT TO DIVERSITY, EQUITY, INCLUSION, AND ACCESSIBILITY

At DePaul University, we strive for a diverse and engaging campus environment that is a model of inclusive excellence in higher education. We reflect our collective values of respecting human dignity and living social and racial justice to achieve transformational change.

OUR PRIORITIZATION OF LIVED EXPERTISE

Together, IGH and IJOH have worked to prioritize participation of people with lived experiences of homelessness. We are happy to have been able to provide free registration for lived experts, and to have supported a portion of travel for all of our lived expert presenters where needed. We have dedicated space for our lived experts to gather or relax during the conference.



COVID-19 PROTOCOL

The health and safety of everyone at the conference depends on the cooperation of all who attend. By taking care of yourself, you protect the entire community. DePaul University's COVID-19 response plans are based on the latest guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Chicago Department of Public Health and the university's medical advisor from AMITA Health. DePaul University continues to be a mask-friendly campus, and a limited number of masks will be available at the conference Help Desk. Hand sanitizer is also available at various stations through the conference venue.

The best way to keep everyone healthy is to arrive healthy in the first place. We recommend everyone take a rapid test the morning of your travel day and consider quality masking if traveling in enclosed transportation such as planes and trains.

The following mandatory protocol must be followed at all times during the conference.

- Monitor yourself for any symptoms.
- If you are experiencing symptoms, please put on a mask immediately, isolate yourself, and contact +1 616 212 7369 via call, text, or WhatsApp.
- An IGH staff member will bring you a rapid test.
- If your rapid test result is negative, you can continue to attend the event but you must wear a KN95 mask. A limited number of masks will be available at the Help Desk.
- If your rapid test result is positive, an IGH staff will provide assistance in making the necessary arrangements for you to isolate and return home when it is safe to do so.
- The IGH staff member will ask for a list of any close contacts at the conference, alert those attendees to their exposure, and distribute additional rapid tests and KN95 masks as needed.

I hope that in gathering with colleagues and new friends, that you can replenish yourself as well, that you can fill up your enthusiasm, your hope, your heart for those without homes. Feel free to have joy this week as we gather together and return home with new knowledge and new enthusiasm for change. We hope that seeing everyone here helps you know that you are not alone in the work.

Please do say 'hi' as we gather together this week as I look forward to meeting you all.



Travel and Transportation

For ground transportation, guests can take public transport via the Chicago Transportation Authority (CTA) buses and trains.

You can buy a Ventra CTA pass for \$5 and then pay per ride for \$2.50, or purchase a 1-Day unlimited pass for \$5, a 3-Day unlimited pass for \$15, or a 7-Day unlimited pass for \$20. Passes work for both buses and trains, and a credit card is recommended as the trains do not accept cash and buses accept exact cash only.

Lived Experience Lounge

A dedicated area will be available for all conference participants with the lived experience of homelessness. The Lived Experience Lounge is on the second floor of the venue in Room 220, at the back of the cafeteria area. The lounge will be accessible from 11am – 5:45pm on Tuesday, March 21; 8am – 4pm on Wednesday, March 22; and 8am – 12pm on Thursday, March 23. Only people with the lived experience of homelessness will be allowed access to this room.

Speaker Ready Room

We have dedicated a Speaker Ready Room on the third floor of the venue, in Room 312. This room is for the use of plenary or concurrent/breakout room speakers who need a quiet space to review or finalize presentations. The room will be accessible from 11am – 5:45pm on Tuesday, March 21; 8am – 4pm on Wednesday, March 22; and 8am – 12pm on Thursday, March 23. Only speakers will be allowed access to this room.

Printing Services

Should speakers need printing or copying services, there are two convenient locations less than a ten-minute walk from the venue: FedEx Office and Print Shop (full service printing) or PrintWithMe Print Kiosk (black and white printing only). In 2022, the Point-in-Time count enumerated 2,612 people living in homeless shelters and 1,263 people living on the street. Many thousands more Chicagoans experience "hidden homelessness" and access homeless services without living on the street or in shelters. The most recent comprehensive statistics are from 2019, estimating that a total of 65,611 people were experiencing homelessness in Chicago, with 49,585 living "doubled up" with friends or family.

We are inviting contributions to a special edition of the International Journal on Homelessness (IJOH) featuring works presented at the March 2023 IJOH

Conference in Chicago.

IJOH recognizes the need for scholarly dissemination on preventing and ending homelessness incorporating truly global perspectives.

IJOH accepts 3 types of submissions that might align with your presentation at the IJOH conference: research papers; discussion papers; and systematic reviews. Research papers should describe original research. Discussion papers are more flexible and include theoretical reflections on issues pertinent to housing and homelessness, or on service delivery experiences and implications. Systematic reviews should follow an established review methodology and provide a novel contribution through conclusions.

If you are unsure if your presentation is a good fit for the journal, please reach out to the Managing Editor through the contact info below. Acceptance to present in the conference is not a guarantee of acceptance of publication in the special edition; your submission will still be submitted for anonymous review. IJOH welcomes scholarly contributions that are critically engaged, conceptually informed, and evidence based.

As part of our commitment to international knowledge exchange, we recognize the value of submissions, reviews, and revisions being conducted in one's preferred language. Therefore, while all publications are ultimately translated to English, we also accept submissions in French, Spanish,

Portuguese, Japanese, and Arabic. Translation into English for final publication is available at no cost thanks to funding provided through the Ruff Institute of Global Homelessness.

All articles are subject to a double-blind peer review process. Articles should be in APA 7th format and fewer than 8,000 words (although exceptions may be made upon discussion with the Managing Editor).
